And we do that on purpose so people will feel free about copying our programs on the air and distributing them.

If people chose, rather than to not do the VCR thing of copying the programs on the air, they do have the option of purchasing the videos in this catalog and then they can also copy those and share those.

Q. Okay. But you don't have a written policy by the Board that says for people who want these items in

our catalog for free or reduced charges because they can't afford them?

- A. Well, I have to refer back to our Bylaws.

 Our Bylaws say that we are charitable and giving and basically that is the function of Three ABN and that's what we strive to do.
- Q. To your knowledge there is no written policy regarding how the guidelines are determined for who qualifies for a free or reduced charge item?
- A. Well, again, I'd have to refer back to our Bylaws because we don't set any standards or qualifications. The gospel is for every kindred, nation, tongue, and people.
- Q. So you don't have a written policy that specifically outlines those factors --
- A. Well, I believe that our bylaws are a written policy.
- Q. Let me just finish the question so that was have a clean record, Ms. Shelton.

You don't have a specific written policy that specifically outlines what factors are used or what direction is given by the Board that says, these people who call and request these items that you sell for free or reduced charges are entitled to them?
